

Talking points

1. When David Parkins drew this cartoon for the Guardian (London) in 2007, a number of the problems the world faced were different. How would you change the labels on the attacking horsemen to reflect the threats we face in today's world? Which labels would stay the same?

2. There are some interesting details to discover in Parkins drawing. Death's horse is a skeleton, Global Warming's horse is burning up, War's horse wears armor, and Disease's horse . . . uh,that's actually a cow. Why a cow? Look up Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy and see how it affected Britain by 2007.

3. Are the land masses on the globe familiar to you? Why did Parkins choose to feature that side of the globe in this drawing?
