

### Talking points

## Between the lines

The Christian Science Monitor announced in Oct. 2008 that it would end its daily print edition, started 100 years ago, and focus on its Web site.

The Tribune Co., owner of the Chicago Tribune and the Los Angeles Times among others, filed for bankruptcy protection on Dec. 8, 2008.

The Minneapolis Star Tribune sought bankruptcy protection on Jan. 16, 2009.

Hearst Corp., is trying to sell the Seattle Post-Intelligencer. It says that if there's no sale within 60 days, the paper may move to a digital-only operation or fold.

Denver's Rocky Mountain News, faces shutdown if a buyer isn't found shortly.

Gannett Co. says it will shut down the Tucson (Ariz.) Citizen if a sale is not completed by March 21.

Both cartoonists featured here work for newspapers that are likely to be shut down within 90 days.
