# Mini Page Heroes: Jane Addams



#### Mini Quote:

"Action is indeed the sole medium of expression for ethics." (Ethics is knowing right from wrong.)

You've probably heard of Mother Teresa, the Roman Catholic nun who devoted her life to helping the world's poor people.

But did you know that more than 100 years ago, an American-born woman did the same?

In 1979, Mother Teresa (an honorary U.S. citizen) won the Nobel Peace Prize. She followed in the footsteps of the first American woman ever to be awarded that prize — Jane Addams.

#### Principles into action

While visiting in Europe in 1887 and 1888, Jane Addams learned of a program in which educated young men moved into a poor section of London and offered classes and activities to people right in their neighborhoods. She thought it was such a great idea that she brought it home and founded Hull-House in the slums of Chicago.

**Hull-House** In a huge old mansion, surrounded by the crowded homes of poor immigrants, Jane Addams and her friends taught their neighbors job skills, cared for their children, started a kindergarten and formed a boys club (known as the Young Heroes Club). Addams and other women volunteers served about 2,000 people a week, offering food, friendship, financial help and education.

### **Working for peace**

Another cause that called Addams to action was world peace, especially as World War I began.

She was the founder and first president of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF). Just as she worked hard at Hull-House to help the poor, she worked hard to promote world harmony.

#### Peace and justice in books

Because Jane also wrote numerous books, each year the Jane Addams Children's Book Awards honor children's books that promote peace and social justice.

We think you will find these books to be great reading. Some of the award-winning books are biographies of heroes, some are stories of young people struggling for freedom, and many are stories of incredible courage.

#### A memorable life

Jane Addams died in Chicago in May 1935. She was 74 years old. She is buried in her hometown of Cedarville, Illinois.
