# 'Toy Story 4' is a solid winner



fter the seemingly perfect end to the Toy Story franchise with "Toy Story 3" (2010), I didn't know what to expect from Pixar with "Toy Story 4"

On one hand, I didn't expect much more than a cash grab, and, on the other hand, I expected Pixar to make it even better than the first three movies.

Either way, "Toy Story 4" blew my expectations out

The story starts with Bonnie, (voiced by Madeleine McGraw) who received Andy's toys at the end of the last film, creating Forkie (Tony Hale) out of trash.

We then see Woody (*Tom Hanks*), help Forkie find out that he's a toy.

It's hard to discuss a lot of what made this film great without giving away spoilers, but I will say there was character growth and great expansions to the Toy Story universe, answering some questions about that Toy Story universe while adding some more along the way.

The character arcs for members of the first film have been expanded upon greatly.

All of this with the best visuals Pixar has to offer, a script with no continuity errors as far as I'm aware, and outstanding writing that I haven't seen since the first movie.

The movie is great in a lot of ways, but (and I know this may sound strange) I think it has too much comedy.

Now, of course, it's Pixar. They're going to put in comedy.

This being a Pixar film, kids are obviously the target audience, but then again, being a Pixar film, anyone can enjoy it,

Duckie (Keegan-Michael Key).

My point is that Bunnie and Duckie are, as I say, just there for laughs, and the story could've been easily rewritten not to include them at all.

Longtime fans of the series won't be disappointed with "Toy Story 4," but the same can't be said for newcomers. If you've somehow managed to avoid watching a single Toy Story movie, I'd recommend you catch up before watching "Toy Story 4."


I can assure you a few tears will be shed in the theater where you watch this in. (You can always tell people they were due to allergies.)

ru Shah and the Song of Death," by Roshani Chokshi is just as good as "Aru Shah and the End of Time," the first book of the planned guartet.


I liked how the book had action from the start, although this would be confusing for people who have not read the first book.

The "Zax Axe" wears out; the foam got ripped up, and the cups stopped suctioning as well as they used to within two weeks of playing with it.


"Zax Axe" is based on a good idea, but with terrible follow-through.























## Poll asks the easiest question ever about NASA and space

Okay, it's not that tough: In a poll conducted by the Associated Press and the NORC Center for Public Affairs Research, most people felt it was more important for NASA to find ways to avoid asteroids hitting the Earth than to put astronauts on the Moon or Mars.

However, it wasn't an either/or question, and they didn't really ask it the way we just did.

What the poll did was to offer a number of goals that NASA could set and ask people which was the most important.

Almost two thirds listed avoid-

ing asteroid collisions as Number One, while support for sending people to other planets was down around 23 percent.

This doesn't mean people don't want an end to space exploration, but many favored sending robots instead of people, because the information is as good and the cost is a great deal less.

# Education, comfort blend in new bear habitat

he Denver Zoo has opened a new bear exhibit called "Harmony Hill Park."

This new bear enclosure is split into two parts:
One side is campground themed, showing visitors
how to camp responsibly and avoid contact with

The other side shows what to do if you live in a bear area, to keep them from coming into your yard.

Harmony Hill replaced the old bear enclosure which was built in 1918. The space was considered progressive in 1918, but the modern Denver Zoo did not feel it best suited the bears needs now.

The old Bear Mountain was too small, and

used pools instead of running water, and bears are not used to pools.

The two grizzly bears at the Denver Zoo are named Tundra, a female, and Kootenai, a male. Each bear has its own emotional story.

Kootenai was walking across the street in Montana when his brother was killed by a car.

Their mom ran off leaving him alone, and he was eventually found by park rangers and sent to the Denver Zoo as a six-month-old cub.

Tundra was in Alaska as a young cub, being taught by her mother how to scavenge through trash cans in local towns.

Sadly, Tundra's mother had to be euthanized because she was considered a threat and her three cubs were sent to zoos across the US.

Tundra's two brothers were sent to South Carolina while Tundra was sent to the Denver zoo, also at six months old.

The bears are now both 17 years old and Tundra weighs about 358 pounds during the winter while Kootenai is at a massive 900 pounds during the winter months.

The bears are fed a diet including fish, berries and vegetables.

While hibernation is not enforced at the Zoo, meaning the bears don't have to hibernate, Tundra once slept for almost 19 days straight.

The keepers train the bears in a public observing area known as the training gate.

The keepers use hand signals and noises to tell the

bears what to do. They do this in part to be able to check the bears' paws and teeth.

You should definitely plan to visit Harmony Hills the next time you are at the zoo.

Just be aware that the exhibit is very popular and be prepared for crowds.

# Iran's complex system adds to Gulf crisis

he United States government says that Iran is responsible for recent attacks on oil tankers in the Straits of Hormuz, a narrow passage between Iran and Oman where the Persian Gulf enters the Indian Ocean.

Iran says its Islamic Revolutionary Guard was not responsible for the attacks, but had come to the aid of a damaged Japanese tanker.

Sorting out the truth starts with understanding Iran's complex governmental system.

Ours is fairly simple: We have Congress to make laws, the President to carry them out and the Supreme Court to rule on whether those laws are written in a way that fits our Constitution.

And our Defense Department, which reports to both the President and Congress, carries out any military actions we require.

Iran is a "theocratic republic," which means it has elections but is run on religious rules as well as by the laws made by its parliament.

They have a Supreme Leader, Ayatollah

Khamenei, a religious leader who serves for life.

They also have a President, Hasan Rohani, and a parliament like our congress, called the Majlis.

Then there is the Guardian Council, made up of religious leaders. It's like our Supreme Court but much more involved in how the nation is run.

For instance, several years ago, the Majlis was starting to pass more modern laws, but the Guardian Council declared that certain candidates could not run for office, which stopped any more of those new laws from being passed.

The Revolutionary Guard reports to the religious leaders, not to the President or Majlis, and it has armed boats that are not part of Iran's Navy.

So even if the Revolutionary Guard carried out the attacks, as the US says, it may not have been what the entire Iranian government wanted.


It is almost as if there were two Iranian governments. You have to know which part you are really dealing with and be sure that branch is in charge of the problem you are discussing.

## Vaping seen as a serious health hazard for young people

The number of young people vaping is rising, just as health experts are working to sort out its potential health hazards.

While vaping may pose less of a risk of lung cancer than smoking, it appears to share some of the other risks, including heart damage.

Experts have also pointed out that, while it seems sensible that taking tobacco smoke into the lungs could cause lung cancer, use of tobacco has been linked to cancer in other parts of the body as well.

What part of tobacco causes these serious health problems?

tobacco can also cause cancer.

If it is the nicotine, then vaping may not be any safer than those other practices.

As it is, the best that can be said about vaping is that it might be better than smoking, and it might help smokers cut down or quit.

But, if you've never used tobacco, using something that is only a little less harmful is still taking on a risk you didn't have before.

Surveys show that more young people are vaping, and San Francisco has decided not to wait for more research: They're making sales of vaping equipment and materials illegal in the city.


