



Gillian Watts, invites readers to experience exotic and familiar animals and insects through super close-up pictures.

Cook's Corner **Bacon-Cheese Biscuits**

You'll need:

- 2 cups baking mix
- 2/3 cup low-fat milk
- 6 strips precooked bacon
- 1/4 cup shredded reduced-fat cheddar cheese

What to do:


- 1. Combine baking mix and milk.
- 2. Heat bacon in microwave according to package directions. Allow bacon to cool and crumble into small pieces.
- 3. Stir both cheeses and crumbled bacon into biscuit mixture.
- 4. Divide dough by 12 spoonfuls onto an ungreased cookie sheet or muffin tins. 5. Bake in 450-degree oven for 10 minutes until golden brown. Serves 6.
