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


How to prevent "Brain Drain" during the summer months:

- Look in the newspaper for summer activities and day camps. Many camps offer reading and math programs.
- Learn to love your library. There are summer programs available for free. Your library can suggest age appropriate books that will keep you reading! Have a hobby? Find a book about it and learn more. Reading can be fun as well as educational.
- Even if you attend public school, some private schools offer summer programs that you can attend. These programs might include academics as well as sports, crafts, and field trips.
- Check out local parks and museums for summer programs. Some of them may even be free.

Before the school year ends, check with your teacher on reading assignments or other suggestions that will help you with the next school year. Just because it's summer doesn't mean you have to stop learning! Just because you're learning doesn't mean you can't have fun!
